

Did You Know We Are Celebrating 40 Years of Keeping Families Together?

BEGINNINGS

The initial Ronald McDonald House of Dallas was the project of Children's Oncology Services of Texas, Inc., a non-profit Texas corporation comprised of parents, doctors, administrators, and Dallas/Ft. Worth McDonald's Owner Operators and headed by Dr. Jo Ann Cornet of the Hematology-Oncology Division of the Children's Medical Center. Located on land donated by St. Paul Medical Center through the generosity of the Daughters of St. Vincent de Paul, RMHD opened its doors in 1981 with a capacity to serve 10 families. This was in large part due to the philanthropic endeavors of Sandra Estess, Chairman of the first capital campaign and Peggy S. Hill, who was Chair of the 1980 Crystal Charity Ball when RMHD was named the sole beneficiary.

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GRAND OPENING

On January 18, 1981, RMHD opened its doors with 10 family bedrooms.

SECOND EXPANSION

In 1994, the House began serving 30 families in total with 26 rooms and 4 transplant apartments.

FIRST TRAINS EXHIBIT

In 1987, the first Trains Exhibit was staged in the lobby of the Crescent Hotel by Ban Bywaters before moving to the galleria in 1989 and NorthPark in 1999. The Trains at NorthPark is RMHD's largest fundraiser.

CHIEF CHEER OFFICER

In 2016, our Chief Cheer Officer was added. Shiloh, a Golden Retriever/Labrador Retriever mix was designated a career change dog by Guide Dogs for the Blind and donated to the House.





FOURTH EXPANSION

On October 10, 2019, we cut the ribbon and began welcoming families into the new wing. The House now had 89 total rooms, a splash pad, new playground equipment, an art installation of handcrafted blown glass butterflies, and various other updates around the House.

40 YEARS



COVID-19

Like everyone else, RMHD had to learn how to operate in a global pandemic. We suspended our volunteer program and sent most of the staff to work from home. We all began to find new ways to work together and continue caring for our guest families. The Trains at NorthPark continued with masks, hand sanitizer, and social distancing. Our generous donors and cooking groups covered much of the cost for individually packed, catered meals.

NEW HOUSE

On December 9, 2009. the new, beautiful RMHD was completed and ready to serve up to 58 families. The House now offered 52 regular guest rooms, 6 transplant apartments, a professional kitchen, dining room, multiple play areas for children and teens, a library and lovely outdoor spaces.

THIRD EXPANSION

In April 2008, RMHD broke ground on the new House. This was also the first year RMHD was the beneficiary of the Addison Rotary Open. 2008 also saw the addition of our Teen Team membership group.











Iver Jude Sturm

Iver Jude Sturm was born on November 11, 2020. On November 18, at just 7 days old, he had his first heart surgery. On February 5, 2021, Iver went into cardiac arrest and had to be revived through CPR. February 16 was the day Iver was placed on the transplant list. There have been many important dates in Iver's life, but for his parents Christy and Leremy, April 7 is one they will never forget. It was the day they got the call that Iver would receive his new heart. Christy remembers, "After waiting 50 days on the UNOS transplant list, our prayers had been answered. Our son was given the greatest gift that he could ever receive, the perfect heart!"

Iver is a fighter, and it is clear that he gets it from his parents. It was during her 20-week ultrasound that Christy and Leremy first learned about Iver's heart condition. Because of Covid-19, Leremy wasn't able to join Christy at her appointments, so she knew something was wrong when her doctor sat her down and told her to get Leremy on the phone. The doctor explained that Iver had a very complex heart condition, as well as heterotaxy syndrome. Iver would ultimately have several additional diagnoses including HLHS, DORV, severe pulmonary stenosis, unbalanced AV canal, and AV valve regurgitation. The doctor was not optimistic about Iver's survival, but Christy and Leremy refused to give up on their son. They relocated from Missoula, Montana, to Dallas so Iver could receive the best care possible as soon as he was born.

While Iver was being cared for by the best doctors at Children's Medical Center Dallas, his parents received their own care at Ronald McDonald House of Dallas. "We have been so blessed to be staying at the Ronald McDonald House. They have been so generous and gave such amazing support through this journey that our family has been on," Christy shared. "We are so glad that we chose Children's Medical

Center for our son! We have had the best care in the cardiac ICU. I knew that our son's condition was extremely rare when one of his transplant surgeons informed us that he hadn't had a situs inversus case in a few years. In Iver's case, not only was his heart full of severe defects, it was also mirror imaged. Therefore, the surgeons had to do some extra work attaching the donor's heart to work for Iver."

All of the surgeon's extra work paid off, and in May, Iver was able to join his parents at RMHD while he recovered from his heart transplant. After a rough first night in his new surroundings, Iver was sleeping through the night, eating like a champ, and thriving! Before his transplant, Iver was small for his age, but "now that he has a new ticker"—as Christy says—he has turned into a little chunk.

Iver and his parents have not had an easy journey. As Christy recalls, "I can't even begin to tell you all of the times that I didn't think Iver was going to make it through this. I knew that trusting God was the only thing that I could do. None of this was in our control, and if the last year has taught us anything, it is exactly that."

When families are going through a medical crisis—especially during a global pandemic—the Ronald McDonald House provides stability during uncertainty. For 40 years, RMHD has been keeping families together, inspiring strength, and giving love and support to families whose children are receiving essential medical care. Since the day our doors opened in 1981, it is our community in Dallas and beyond that has allowed us to continue to live out our mission. On behalf of the Sturms and the 40,000 other families who have called RMHD their home-away-from-home, thank you for keeping families close!





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
